## Film Criticism – Interpreting Reality

Your homework this week is challenging. It asks you to apply what we talked about in class. Film criticism, or different ways of interpreting a movie as a "text" – a reflection of personal experience and reality – isn't easy, but it is rewarding.

Your first required film is <u>The Bicycle Thief</u>. As we discussed in class, this is an Italian neorealist film. It is about a small, almost mundane incident in one family's life. It is filmed in real places with real people rather than actors. It may bore you; it may win your heart; it may do both. I have 2 questions for you about this film:

- 1. Neorealism and Cinema Verite are both about social causes and the human condition. In the <u>Bycycle Thief</u>, what is the social problem? Is it human nature or is it social oppression? Prove it to me; why do you come to that conclusion?
- 2. Neorealism tried very hard to stay away from the typical "Hollywood" way of making a movie. In the film, what is "real" and what is "artistic"? What part of the "real" is effective for you as a viewer?

Your second required film is a totally different one - <u>Fight Club</u>. Fight Club is all about interpreting reality. It is the opposite of *The Bicycle Thief* in that it does NOT try to just show reality. The director actively manipulates reality and your (the viewer's) perception of it. The film is a wonderful opportunity for you to use your newly –acquired film criticism knowledge. I only have 2 questions for you here as well, but the second one is a biggie!

What does the viewer see/not see in the process of the movie? How do the decisions of the film maker actively craft the viewer's "reality"?

Okay...now...

The "reality" in *Fight Club* can be interpreted in a variety of ways. Pick **one** of the following ways of interpreting it:

- Psychological
- Structural
- Marxist

And write a brief (like 1-2 paragraph) interpretation of the film on the basis of that viewpoint.
